RABBIT HOLDING AN EGG CARROT

SUPPLIES:

- Rabbit template printed on paper
- Glue dots or clear tape, or Low temp hot glue gun (adult-use)
- Scissors
- Watercolor, markers, pencils or crayons
- Orange egg (plastic or a real egg that's been dyed orange)

Print the rabbit template out on white paper. I like to use white cardstock for crafts children are going to glue or paint.

Have children color the template including the rabbit and carrot top. Cut out the template. Children may need assistance with this part or you can have them bubble cut around the small edges.

If you are using a plastic egg, now is the time to fill it with candy or treats. Glue the carrot leaves to the wide end of the egg.

Note: We used glue dots in place of craft glue to avoid getting glue on candy. If you don't have glue dots just remind your kiddos that a little glue goes a long way, and they should start with just a dot as they are gluing their craft together. You may also want to try clear tape, or have an adult use a low-temp glue gun instead.

Glue the egg to the rabbit's stomach by putting a glue dot on the bottom half of the egg and sticking it to the rabbit's tummy. This allows the egg to be opened (if it is a plastic egg). Make sure the carrot leaves are up.

Glue the rabbit's paws to the egg by gently bending the arms around the egg. Place a glue dot on the end of the paw, then attach it to the egg. If you are using a plastic egg, make sure to place the paws on the top or bottom part of the egg and avoid the opening.

Now the Easter Rabbit craft is done, I hope you have a Happy Easter!
